A note on Morten Lauridsen's Lux aeterna: Lauridsen was born in the Pacific Northwest of the USA in 1943. The Los Angeles Master Chorale gave the first performance of Lux aeterna on 13 April 1997. For your Editors, who are unfamiliar with Lauridsen, the CD of a number of his works, including Lux aeterna, by Polyphony and the Britten Sinfonia conducted by Stephen Layton on Hyperion has proved a valuable introduction. The CD is accompanied by informative notes by Byron Adams. He quotes the Times music critic Hilary Finch as noting that Lux aeterna is a "classic of new American choral writing. In this light-filled continuum of secret texts, old world structures and new world spirit intertwine in a cunningly written score, at once sensuous and spare". Byron Adams also quotes Lauridsen himself as describing Lux aeterna as an "intimate work of quiet serenity" that expresses "hope, reassurance, faith and illumination in all of its manifestations". It is clear that

WFCS will be grateful to Peter Nardone for introducing us to another significant contemporary choral composer.

# A Note from Judy Jenkins, Tickets Secretary

We have to adopt a new Cathedral Seating Plan for our next Season of concerts in which the audience will be east-facing. This has presented many problems for all concerned; not the least being the necessity to give concessionary prices for those whose view is obscured by the pulpit. The plan shows these, the seats held by Worcester Live and those available on-line. The seats already taken by Patrons (who have priority booking), and those reserved for VIPs and guests of soloists are also shown. These were all correct on Aug 1<sup>st</sup> but Booking is now LIVE. As usual, you can book tickets in several ways:-

\*Worcester Live Box Office – in person or on 01905 611427 (A booking fee will be charged)
\*On-Line from our website by clicking on 'Buy Tickets' (A booking fee will be charged). You can

\*On-Line from our website by clicking on 'Buy Tickets'. (A booking fee will be charged) You can choose to print off your E- tickets (free) or have 'mobile tickets' sent to your Mob 'phone or they will be posted to you (both chargeable).

Both systems now work very efficiently and I will not need to be selling tickets on Monday nights at 7pm in September. However, I can answer your queries and help out with any problems you may have. I have access and can monitor the on-line sales at any time.

Just a reminder here of what's available:

\*Concessions apply for people aged 60yrs+ and full-time students (excluding front nave)

\*A limited number of accessible seats with adjacent free companion seat are available through me.


\*Children aged 9-15 accompanying a paying adult are admitted free.

Members' Discounts available through me :-

\*Buy 5 tickets and get one free (ideal to give away tickets to someone new to choral music or as a present)

\*Buy one ticket for each of our three concerts and get a 20% discount on that package. ie 3 Front Nave tickets = £60 instead of £75.

Here is the Seating Plan under the new arrangements:



While we do not wish to distract you during rehearsals, you may be interested to know that the Worcester News announced on 28 July 2016 that the Cathedral has received a substantial grant from the First World War Centenary Fund, a Treasury initiative of 2014, to pay for the restoration of the west window, one of a series of windows designed and installed in the Cathedral by John Hardman & Co of Birmingham between 1854 and 1875. The window depicts the story of the Creation. This outcome is the achievement of the Dean and Chapter, and their staff and professional advisers, and follows an earlier successful application to the same Fund in respect of the Cathedral's east window, also by Hardman; that restoration was completed last year.

# WFCS Patrons scheme, weekly raffle, and 100 Club

Those who work on these valuable fundraising arrangements will be on hand at rehearsals to provide information about them and encourage participation.

The Patrons scheme allows pre-booking of chosen seats for all the concerts in a Season, and various benefits including concert interval refreshments in the Chapter House.

The weekly raffle provides the opportunity of splendid prizes for modest investment. The organisers welcome contributions of the splendid prizes.

Likewise, the 100 Club provides the opportunity of handsome cash prizes for modest investment.

All these hard-worked initiatives help to keep subscriptions down and concert quality high.

Our Social Secretary, Sue White (A), thanks all the chorus members who have contributed food and time to hosting the refreshments for the orchestra on concert days (Orchestra Teas). This is much appreciated not only by Sue for helping her but also by the visiting orchestral players whom this hospitality makes feel valued and welcome.
