Then Bach's *St Matthew Passion* to tackle in March 2025 - not for the faint hearted but under the enthusiastic direction of Sam keenly accompanied by Nick, and our own hard work and conviction, I feel sure we can produce a good performance. Much to look forward to!

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May I take this opportunity to sincerely thank our committee and other helpers involved in putting the concerts and Come and Sing together, for all their hard work over the season – fabulous teamwork which is directly responsible for our success both on and off the stage.

We would dearly like other members of the choir to come and offer to join the team and helpers. 'Many hands make light work' I think is the adage. Please make yourselves known to any committee member if you think you could help. You would be helping the choir to flourish for future years.

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MIRROR OF PERFECTION

A BRIEF HISTORY FROM THE COMPOSER



I wrote and conducted the premiere of Mirror Of Perfection in 1996 at the request of Dame Merle Park for the Royal Ballet School, of which I was Director of Music. To my surprise and conductor deliaht the Ronald programmed it shortly afterwards at the Royal Festival Hall with his New London Choir, and at that concert Peter Gelb, head of Sony Classics, offered to release it on CD. Also in the audience was the BBC Producer Peter Maniura, who simultaneously commissioned a BBC music film of the piece, with Jeremy Irons narrating the words of St Francis of Assis between the movements. It was called Seven Canticles of St. Francis. Since then, Mirror has been

performed over 160 times in the UK, Israel, the USA, Italy, Germany, Czech Republic and, most recently in Palma Cathedral, Mallorca in the presence of Queen Sophia of Spain. Perhaps the most poignant performance of all was that given by the Bournemouth Symphony Chorus in the Lower Basilica of San Francesco in Assisi, with the choir and orchestra performing literally above the tomb of the saint. I'll never forget the sight of the Franciscans, who refused to take seats that could be occupied by visitors, standing in a horseshoe around the Lower Basilica, listening intently to the music.


PRE-CONCERT TALK

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BEETHOVEN'S MASS IN C

The poorly-received first performance

Ludwig van Beethoven's *Mass in C* was commissioned by Prince Nikolaus Esterházy II in 1807, when Beethoven was 37 years of age. This commission was an extension of a tradition established by Joseph Haydn, who had been the family's *Kapellmeister* for a number of decades and dedicated one mass to them each year. Haydn ceased the annual composition in 1802 owing to his failing health, and after a five year break the Prince asked Beethoven (who had been Haydn's pupil) to reprise the tradition.

Beethoven did not take this commission lightly: in a letter to the Prince, he wrote, "may I just say that I will hand the mass over to you with great trepidation, as Your Serene Highness is accustomed to having the inimitable masterworks of the great Haydn performed."

It is clear from that Beethoven studied Haydn's masses as he composed the *Mass in C*. His sketches for the Gloria include two passages copied from Haydn's *Schöpfungsmesse*.

The premiere performance was given by the Prince's own musical forces in Eisenstadt on 13th September 1807. Unfortunately, the performance was under-rehearsed (it has been noted that only one of the five altos in the choir attended the rehearsal) and the new mass was not well received by the Prince. He asked Beethoven "what is it that you have done?" immediately after the performance, causing Beethoven to leave the room in anger.

The Prince betrayed even more strident views of the piece in a letter to the Countess Henriette von Zielinska, where he wrote, "Beethoven's mass is unbearably ridiculous and detestable, and I am not convinced that it can ever be performed properly. I am angry and mortified."

The musicologist Charles Rosen has described the performance of the *Mass in C* as Beethoven's "most humiliating public failure".

The mass was eventually published by Breitkopf & Hartel in 1812, when it was dedicated to a different prince, Prince Kinsky of Wchinitz and Tettau, no doubt as a result of the traumas involved with the first performance and the reaction that it generated.

Whilst still the least widely performed of Beethoven's major works (and, in many ways, usurped by the later *Missa Solemnis*), the *Mass in C* is now recognised for its structure and orchestration by musicologists.

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LOOKING AHEAD TO **WORCESTER THREE CHOIRS** 27 July – 3 August 2024



Fifty-eight members of the Society successfully auditioned for the Three Choirs Festival Chorus back in October. The prepared part of the audition was from the Benedictus in Sarah Kirkland Snider's *Mass for the Endangered* which receives its UK premier at the Festival on 29th July. The Festival in Worcester this year starts for the Chorus with Holst - *Hymn of Jesus* and Stanford - *Stabat Mater* on 27th July and finishes with Elgar - *The Kingdom* on 3rd August with a full week of music making in between. The full programme launch is on 15th March, member's booking starts on 8th April with general booking on 29th April.

Festival Voices is a separate Chorus designed both for singers who can't commit to a full festival week and those who don't yet feel ready

for our auditioned chorus, the Three Choirs Festival Voices performs in one concert within the festival week. Opportunities exist for local performers to take part on the Bandstand in the Festival Village and there is a participation project "Nature Sings" involving local schools. Volunteering opportunities exist for a variety of roles to support the Festival.

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COME & SING ROSSINI!

13 April: 1-day choral workshop hosted by WFCS

Please support our popular annual Come & Sing one-day choral workshop at St Andrew's Methodist Church, Worcester on Saturday 13 April – which we greatly rely on as our biggest WFCS fund-raiser of the year!



Open both to WFCS chorus members and other amateur singers, this year's Come & Sing workshop offers a chance to learn Rossini's Romanticera gem, *Petite Messe Solennelle*.

This time we'll be under the expert direction of one of the UK's leading choirmasters (and former WFCS Director of Music!) Eton College Organist and Music **Teacher** Christopher Allsop. We'll also have piano accompaniment from **WFCS** esteemed Accompanist, acclaimed organist and recitalist Nicholas Freestone; and four talented soloists will join us for the informal afternoon performance.

Combining drama, pathos and colour, the 1863 *Petite Messe Solennelle* was Rossini's last serious composition. Though a heartfelt religious work, it was written for a Paris salon rather than a church, and is full of the delightful touches of an astonishing man of the theatre.

Around 150 amateur singers from across the UK are expected to attend. Participants don't need experience to take part, but some ability to read music is recommended. Loan of a vocal score and free teas/coffees are included in the ticket price. There will be plenty of refreshment breaks and chances to socialise, plus homemade cakes and pre-orderable hot lunches and

sandwiches to tempt the tastebuds!

Doors open for registration from 9:30am, with singing sessions starting from 10:15am. At 3.45pm there will be an informal performance which singers' guests can attend free of charge. The day closes by 4.45 pm.

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WORCESTER'S FUTURE MUSICIANS

On Saturday 27 April 2024 'MASS IN BLUE' hits town! Will Todd's exhilarating jazz setting of the Latin Mass will be the highlight of a special concert in Worcester Cathedral, the culmination of an educational choral singing project with Worcestershire secondary schools.

Students and teachers from seven local schools will be joined by Worcester Cathedral's Youth Choir (and Nicholas Freestone acting as rehearsals accompanist), the RSCM Millennium Youth Choir and a high school choir from the USA in a remarkable local, national and international collaboration.

This ambitious project has given the chance for young people from any background and without previous experience to work with and perform alongside some of the country's leading and most inspiring musicians: conductor Neil Ferris (Chorus Director, BBC Symphony Chorus), composer Will Todd and the Will Todd Ensemble, vocalist/composer/workshop leader Aga Serugo-Lugo, and saxophone superstar and BBC R3 presenter, Jess Gillam MBE.

Around 180 students and teachers will combine to perform the Mass with the 12-piece band and soprano soloist **Lorna James.** The programme includes Will Todd's stunningly beautiful arrangement of *Amazing*

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FROM THE **MINUTE BOOK**

My thanks to Stephen Greenwood for once more looking through our archives to find something of interest from the minute books. The following section is a transcription of part of the minutes from our 1956-57 season.

"This year, in addition to the November and December concerts, the Society sang the unaccompanied motet *O Bone Jesu* by Palestrina during the interval of an organ recital in February. As an experiment this was sung from the Lady Chapel and many commented on the striking effect this produced.

On Sunday, 2nd June, 1957, Members of the Society took part in the Elgar Centenary Service which was broadcast on the BBC Home Service. The music included "*The Spirit of the Lord*" from "*The Apostles*", and Norma Procter sang "*The Angel's Farewell*" from "*The Dream of Gerontius*". The society also joined in the Festival of Christmas Carols on 19th December, 1956.

The singing membership of the Society reached a record figure of 256 (how did they fit on the staging! Ed) and this largely accounted for the satisfactory credit balance of £106 in the General Account, though the concert account showed a loss of £131 on the season. The latter figure stresses the need, in these days of increased production costs caused by higher orchestra and soloists' fees, for increasing the income by widening the sales of tickets.

It is with great regret that the society now says farewell to Mr. David Willcocks as its conductor. Mr Willcocks has been with us for six years and during this time he has given himself wholeheartedly to securing a high standard in the Societies' performances. As enjoyable as the performances were the weekly rehearsals when one experienced many interesting and happy hours under his enthusiastic leadership. The Society expressed its good wishes to Mr Willcocks at an informal sherry party which was held in College Hall on 31 August 1957, and Members and Patrons subscribed together for a Worcester porcelain dinner service, which was presented to him at the gathering by the Bishop of Worcester."





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IN MEMORIAM

REMEMBERING PAST MEMBERS

Sadly since the last issue of the Choral Chronicle in August we have have been informed of the deaths of four of our members. We remember them below.

Kate Aydon Alto

Kate was borne and brought up in the Thames Valley at Maidenhead.

After 'A levels' she went to Art College in Brighton and subsequently, Central St. Martin's College in London to study Art and Theatre design.

She was married in 1969 and moved with her husband to Manchester where he was at university studying Landscape Design.

Kate's first experience of choral singing was when she joined Bingham Choral Society in Nottinghamshire, together with her sister Jane, ten years her junior, studying for an Accountancy qualification at Nottingham University.

Kate subsequently moved to Worcester in 1988 with two young children, Chloe and Thomas, where her husband, Arthur, established a Landscape design practice.

Kate joined WFCS shortly after her move in 1988 and continued singing with the Society without a break until shortly before her death from MND in September 2023, a matter of some 35 years; including several years from 1994 singing with the Three Choirs Festival Chorus.

In 2004 Kate met and subsequently married Patrick Aydon, himself a chorus member of WFCS for forty years, and a fellow Three Choirs Chorus member.....such is the power of Choral singing! Kate loved her singing and music in general...it really was the rock on which she built her life.

Barbara Hopper Alto

After spending most of their adult lives in the Sheffield area of Yorkshire, Barbara and Peter Hopper retired to Worcester in the year 2000, for better weather midway between various family members. Peter had been a teacher and then a vicar, whilst Barbara had worked in administration, but also wherever they lived Barbara had researched the local history and produced booklets and dramas based on her research, writing sketches, poems, songs and narratives. She had also sung in choral societies where possible.

In 'retirement' Peter led church services all over Worcestershire, whilst Barbara threw herself into Warndon Church, local history and singing, including the Church Singing Group, WFCS and the Three Choirs Festival. She wrote a short history of Warndon Church, which included a lot about the people of the farming community it used to serve. Several booklets

followed: Ages & Ages before Warndon Villages, Walking around Warndon Villages and Farms of Eastern Worcester. Finally, after Peter died in 2016, Barbara produced in 2020 another walks booklet entitled Walks from Lockdown. All profits from her books went to charity.

After a few years of health problems, the heavenly choir is now boosted by a new alto voice...

Judith was originally from Lancashire and studied music at Homerton College, Cambridge and then Modern Educational Dance at Chelsea College, Eastbourne. She came to Worcester in the 1970s as a Lecturer at the Teacher Training College and she was proud that she was still there when it subsequently became Worcester University.

Judith loved singing and sang with The Elgar Chorale, touring with them to South Africa and France, as well as with WFCS where she enjoyed performing in a number of Three Choirs Festivals. She was also a very fine actor and appeared regularly at the Swan Theatre. Notable parts included the title role in *Miss Jean Brodie*, Nelly Forbush in *South Pacific* and Lady India in *Ring around the Moon*. In collaboration with Gabrielle

Bullock, Judith wrote and performed in a number of Poetry and Music presentations. She died in December at her home.

Adrian Deane Tenor

Until very recently Adrian was singing Second Tenor with WFCS. He died unexpectedly a few days before Christmas. Adrian had many skills and interests: Music was a life-long hobby. He loved folk, blues and classical music. As a child, he was Head chorister at St George's Church, Nailsworth often singing solo for the first verse of Once in Royal David's City at Christmastime. He also sang as a child chorister at the Three Choirs Festival. As an adult, he returned to choral singing, joining the Worcester Festival Choral Society with Christine. He enjoyed being part of many concerts especially Handel's Messiah each December in Worcester Cathedral. At home, a favourite moment was listening to 'Carols at King's" on Christmas morning. Adrian was also a talented bass player, performing in several blues and folk bands including Jigantics and Sons of the Delta. He also enjoyed supporting his fellow band mates at their gigs.

Motorsport was another special interest. He was a Navigator at car rallies and was a big part of local motorsport clubs including EM-COS and Cirencester Car Club. He also loved building and fixing cars at the Barn at Bisley. Adrian was a Licensed Scrutineer at hill climbs including Shelsley Walsh, Prescott, Oulton Park and Curborough and at VSCC (Vintage meetings) & the F1 Grand Prix at Silverstone. He will be greatly missed by all his family and friends in music and motorsport





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SPONSORED CYCLE RIDE FOR MND



I would like to thank everyone from WFCS who has supported me in raising money for the My Names'5 Doddie Foundation which funds research into MND and support for patients and their relatives. https://www.myname5doddie.co.uk/

Singing Brahms *Requiem* in November alongside Patrick Aydon in a concert dedicated to his wife Kate a long-term member of the choir who was lost to Motor Neurone Disease last year inspired me to taking part in Doddie aid 2024 by cycling as far as possible between 1 Jan and 3 February.

As I write, close to the end of the challenge, I have covered 509 Miles despite a week of icy weather and a crash on one of the many potholes in Herefordshire. The fund raising has gone more smoothly than the miles on the road and has reached £917 so far and with Gift Aid it is up to £1173. Much of this came from WFCS members.

I took up singing when I retired around 8 years ago and I joined WFCS in November 2022 in time to sing *Messiah* in December. On the other hand I have been a keen cyclist for nearly 55 years, and to quote a song that is unlikely to make the programme of one of our concerts any time soon, "We've been together now for forty years". "That is me and my bike. A Raleigh Classic which I bought new on 26 May 1984 for £265. I guess over those years we have covered at least 100,000 miles. The bike is a little like the Trigger's Broom, it has a just three original parts remaining.

I have a second bike which is also a Raleigh Classic which I keep in close to original condition. In 1987 I met a neighbour, John, because we had identical bikes. More than 20 years on John died of MND and I bought his bike from his widow. In 2022 I did the same Doddie Aid Challenge, with John in mind. Then the weather was kinder to me, I did not crash, and the challenge ran until 12 February. I cycled 1,655 miles and also raised a little over £1,000. I suppose the difference is that two years on I am clearly a little older and a lot slower but one thing has improved, the amount of money I have raised per mile has trebled! I put that down to the generosity of members of WFCS – thanks again to everyone who has sponsored me.


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WFCS HITS THE HIGH STREET


